WELCOME

A liberal, tolerant government is overthrown. The revolutionary is the ultraconservative younger brother of the progressive leader who has opened a society previously dominated by their hard-liner father. The progressive leader is exiled into a wilderness where misfits, the homeless, and undesirables have previously been dumped. Making the most of the situation, the exiled leader tries to band his motley group into a new utopia, with freedom and understanding for all, while his brother institutes the repression of gays and women and replaces comedy and music with gladiatorial combat for entertainment.

This description comes not from our currently combustible world political scene but from a four-hundred year old

comedy, **As You Like It.** Shakespeare clearly understood the cynicism of the verse from Ecclesiastes 1:9, "What has been will be again and what has been done will be done again. There is nothing new under the sun." Yet unlike his fool Jaques, who cynically observes "All the world's a stage, and the men and women merely players," Shakespeare was not interested in merely pointing out the endless cycle of growth and retreat. For him, the wilderness into which his protagonists have been driven, is a magical doorway where each has the opportunity to face their elusive truth, battle their worst demons, and once they have fully accepted who they are, find true love. The forest is a magical place, not because it makes things easy for its cast-offs but it serves as a laboratory where they can learn who they truly are. As an actor, steeped in theatre, Shakespeare truly understood the mutability of personality. He also understood that it is much more difficult for the comfortable to confront the troubling truths that can lead to real growth.

By updating this classic romantic comedy into the 21st century, and adding their wondrous score, Shaina Taub and Laurie Woolery have made the gender confusion of the Rosalind/Orlando story even more subtly complex. Turning Touchstone's Audrey into Andy, and Phoebe's Sylvius into Sylvia, gives each of the queer couples deliciously existential problems to solve. Shakespeare was fascinated with identity and used banishment as a tool to pry open the hearts of his humans so they could change. He knew instinctively that we are who we pretend to be, and our roles change throughout our lives. As I have been using the empathy muscle in rehearsals to try and channel Shakespeare and interpret his impulses, I have become convinced that he would have thoroughly enjoyed this musical version of his play.

YES, IT'S BETTER TO HAVE LOVED AND LOST... AS YOU LIKE IT: THE MUSICAL!

At the apex of living and growing is the goal of selfhood as teens, parents, professionals, failed or successful lovers, we humans strive ever-upward. But it's also true that at the heart of living and growing is the loss of selfhood. Circumstances and relationships change – and if selfhood is conceived purely as building and consolidation, then life must inevitably disappoint us. As sure as we live on this earth, we'll become exiles from something; youth, jobs. committee memberships, social groups, families, identities. This kind of alum picture is what Jaques describes in his famous "All the World's a Stage" speech, in which he represents life as a long and arduous journey through various stages of disenchantment. If, like Jaques, we choose to dwell in sorrowful allegiance to the past, we'll also live in regret. But this play (and this musical!) mashes together the darkness of loss with the light of discovery. Yes, exile can yield loss and emptiness: but this very vacant space can also burst with opportunity as we step from our pasts into the unknown forest of the future.

Specifically, **As You Like It** is full of disintegrated families. A father has lost a daughter; two sons have lost a father, as well as each other; two other brothers have lost all bonds of birthright; a daughter has lost a father, while another daughter chooses to leave behind the father who has failed his family bonds. And yet such loss in the biological family makes room for characters to build new families that better serve their changing ideals. As each exile in **As You Like It** crosses over from the Court to the Forest of Arden, we, the audience, get the chance to experience their mixture of surprise and anticipation. With varying degrees of fear and delight, they discover in the forest that their "selves" are not only the identities they once inhabited: a Duke can become a stoic philosopher; a forlorn son can become an ambassador for love; young girls can become men, shucking off the gender constraints that once limited their choices; new families can be built in the rubble of failed biological relationships; and even those known as "evil" can come to believe that they are also good-people-in-waiting. We will never lose our past selves - we've lived in them, after all. But we can be more than those past selves, living all the more richly for having embraced change.

In such transformations, Shakespeare (and, in our production, Shaina Taub and Laurie Woolery) juxtapose love and death as a herald to change. Death may spell mourning; but it can also bring hope. And as we see our characters in the midst of their journeys from Court to Forest and from loss to reimagining, we dramaturgs are also reminded of Woody Allen's Boris in the movie, *Love and Death*, who says, "And so I walk through the valley of the shadow of death. Actually, make that "I RUN through the valley of the shadow of death – in order to get out of the valley of the shadow of death more quickly, you see..." In the very moment of loss lies also humor and hope, and thus a passage to the future. Far from walking solemnly with Jaques as he contemplates life as a series of regrettable aches and nose-dives, we might choose to run (or, in our musical, to dance, skip and sing) through loss to laughter and rebirth. Welcome, everybody, to *As You Like it*: the Musical!

ABOUT THE PLAYHOUSE

San Francisco Playhouse is celebrating twenty years as San Francisco's Empathy Gym. Presenting a diverse range of plays and musicals, the Playhouse produces new works as well as reimagined classics, "making the edgy accessible and the accessible edgy." Its bold Sandbox Series - the only subscription series in the Bay Area devoted solely to presenting world premieres - is dedicated to nurturing new playwrights beyond readings. There is also a commitment to more in-depth new work through individual commissions, including plays by Ruben Grijalva, Michael Gene Sullivan, Theresa Rebeck, Christopher Chen, Lauren Gunderson, and Aaron Loeb. The Playhouse has developed, presented, and transferred three world premieres to New York. Gunderson's Bauer and Loeb's Ideation opened Off-Broadway, and Loeb's Abraham Lincoln's Bia, Gay Dance Party won the best of New York International Fringe Festival. Their commitment to new works in the San Francisco Playhouse Sandbox Series has been honored by grants from the National Endowment for the Arts and the American Theatre Wing. The Playhouse secured their two highest-profile commissions to date: Shoot Me When by Ruben Grijalva, which was presented online during the pandemic and was awarded a Will Glickman Award, Seared by Theresa Rebeck, which opened the 2016-2017 Mainstage Season and was nominated for ten San Francisco Bay Area Theatre Critics Circle awards, and You Mean to Do Me Harm by Christopher Chen, winner of the Lanford Wilson Award from the Dramatists Guild of America in 2016. Works developed by the Playhouse have gone on to receive regional and national acclaim. Yockey's Pluto – a Playhouse commission – was named a National New Play Network Rolling World Premiere, George Brant's Grounded - a Playhouse premiere - was produced at the Public Theater starring Anne Hathaway and directed by Julie Taymor in 2015, and Loeb's Abraham Lincoln's Big, Gay Dance Party has received productions from Birmingham to Off-Broadway. sfplayhouse.org

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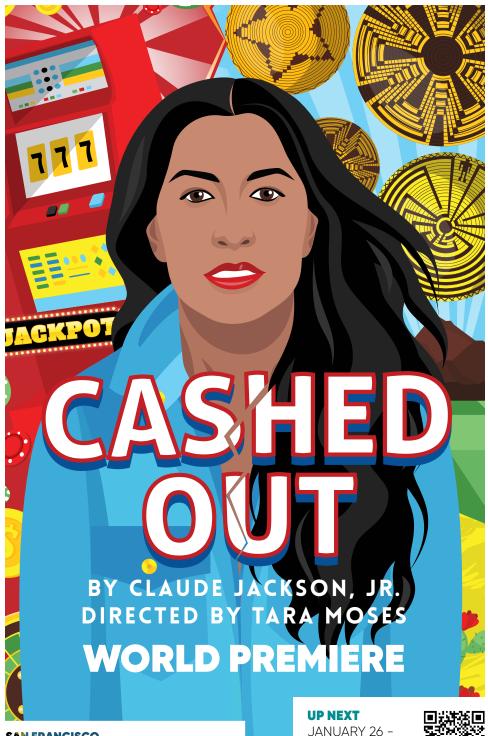
